We also worked on our 2015 calendar, highlighting partner events and GPSEN

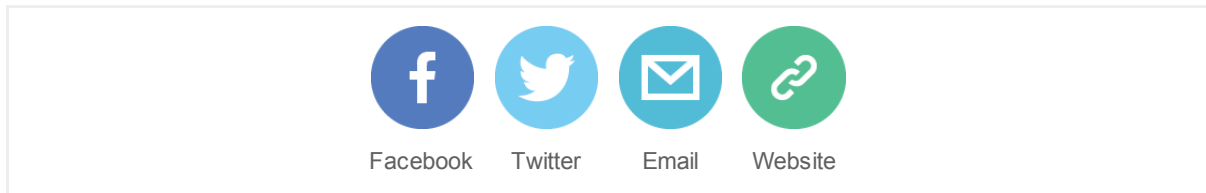
projects. To make sure that your events are included on the annual calendar, please take a few minutes to complete our [calendar survey](#).
