Three measures appearing on the ballot this November are of particular interest to many of our partners and friends. Now is the time to step up and take action! Join us for presentations about:

- A measure to create a [permanent funding base for the Tualatin Soil and Water Conversation District](#), that will support programs to improve air, water and soil quality, community education programs, and healthy habitats by removing invasive species.
- [Measure 26-178, Protect Our Natural Areas](#), preserves our region's legacy of protecting natural areas and water quality, restoring fish and wildlife, and connecting people with nature. Voters in the Metro region will be asked to renew the 2013 parks and natural areas levy this November, helping to protect 17,000 acres of parks, trails and natural areas without raising taxes. The levy supports Metro's [Nature in Neighborhoods](#) program.
- [Measure 99, Outdoor School for All](#), will give every Oregon fifth and sixth-graders a hands-on week of science-based, outdoor education to get kids off their screens, build self-confidence and self-reliance, strengthen leadership and collaborative skills, and connect them with Oregon's great outdoors.

Thomas Jefferson maintained an almost unbroken record of weather observations between 1776 and 1816, and George Washington took his last observation just a few days before he died. Today, there are many opportunities to study climate through citizen science, a form of open collaboration where members of the public participate in the scientific process to address real-world issues. These opportunities provide authentic learning experiences for their participants and stimulate a conservation ethic. The American Association of Community Colleges (AACC), through its Sustainability Education & Economic Development (SEED) Center, will select five winning community colleges for their exemplary work to promote sustainability education. The winning colleges will each receive a \$10,000 cash prize.

As part of a national effort to support sustainability practices, programs and training at the nation's more than 1,100 community colleges, the [American Association of Community Colleges \(AACC\)](#) awards cash prizes to exemplary community colleges for their sustainability education initiatives through their SEED Center initiative. The Green Genome Awards are based on the SEED Center's publication, "[The Community College Green Genome Framework: Integrating Sustainability and Clean Technology Workforce Development into the Institution's DNA](#)," which lays out the types of characteristics that we are looking for in the winners. This free tool for colleges details the Green Genome framework for self-assessment, pathways to success and offers profiles of previous winning colleges. The framework was developed through extensive review of existing college programs by a national advisory panel made up of senior leaders at the [U.S. Department of Energy](#), industry professionals, national associations and over 50 community colleges.



Environmental Education and Community Stewardship Report

This [newly released report](#) is a synthesis of the foremost thinking on how environmental education can lead to conservation objectives through community stewardship. It compiles the best available research and was guided by interviews of leading experts. Designed to advise the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation on their conservation education grant making, yet written as a comprehensive piece, the report can be useful across the field; it can guide environmental education investors, help practitioners improve their program design, and give evidence to program directors that what they are doing will lead to change at a landscape scale. While the research connecting environmental education to conservation outcomes is still emerging, the most important lesson outlined here is to be intentional in program design so that programs are based on the leading research, evidence, and practices. This report provides that much needed synthesis and analysis in one document.
